EPISODE 1: POLITICS

EMANCIPATION & POLITICAL ZIONISM

We start with a brief history of the Jewish people leading up to the moment of Jewish emancipation in Europe. The offer of emancipation sparked a great debate among Jews. Some communities felt excitement about the prospect of individual equality and sought to assimilate further. Others felt that the Jews would never truly be viewed as equal in the nation-states that were forming around them. Zionism took root among the latter group, emerging as one of the many liberation movements of this time. The founders of political Zionism asserted that Jews should finally have a home and become masters of their own fate.
